

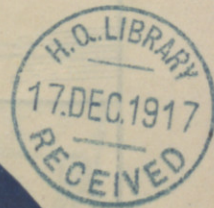

CABLE NEWS FROM AUSTRALIA

Children's Museum, Melbourne.

Melbourne, 9th May.

The first Children's Museum in Australia was opened at the National Gallery, Melbourne, on Tuesday, May 8th. It was inaugurated by Professor Baldwin Spencer, and the opening ceremony was performed by the daughter of the Governor, Sir H. L. Stanley. The museum is devoted to children's interests and pleasures. It contains fine collections, with names simplified, of birds, butterflies, fish, etc., attractively arranged.

The Queensland Referendum.

Brisbane, 9th May.

The latest figures of the Queensland Referendum for the abolition of the Legislative Council are: 93,093 for, and 147,326 against.

French Aid for the Red Cross.

Melbourne, 9th May.

The Alliance Francaise of Victoria is holding a soirée on Friday in aid of the British Red Cross. The Treasurer of the French Red Cross is appealing to his fellow subjects to make the movement a success, as it is the first opportunity the French people have had to reciprocate the generosity of Australians in France.

Kalgoorlie-Port Augusta Railway.

Perth, 10th May.

The Kalgoorlie-Port Augusta Railway is expected to be open for traffic in September.

School Units in Victoria.

Melbourne, 10th May.

In connection with the special appeal for the formation of a Victorian Public School unit, enrolment is progressing. The Defence Department has authorised the formation of a Bantam Battalion.

Governor-General Reviews N.Z. Troops

Sydney, 10th May.

The Governor-General took the salute at Sydney on Wednesday in a march past of the New Zealand (Maori) troops, who have been training in New South Wales for some weeks. Thousands of spectators were present and every arm of the service represented.

Mr. Hughes on Australia's Verdict.

Melbourne, 10th May.

Mr. Hughes, speaking of Australia's election verdict, at the Lord Mayor's quarterly dinner, Melbourne, in a stirring speech, which was enthusiastically received, said that this great nationalist victory is not a party triumph; it is a victory for the good over the evil elements in our midst. The national spirit of Australia now stands erect, smiling and triumphant. Australia stood, as it were, at the parting of the ways: she has taken the high road to duty. The Empire rejoices; the men at the front will be heartened to know that the men and women for whom they are dying are sufficiently self-sacrificing to put aside the petty differences that divided them, and stand resolutely behind the win-the-war party. This Government will conserve all the true interests of Labour and will promote all that is worthy in Unionism. It will protect the workers from exploitation, will endeavour to find employment for the people, will develop resources, encourage industries, and bend all its energies to the greatest purpose of all—winning the war. It will give all classes in this country justice and fair dealing. Purged of foul disorders which invaded its system, Australia will now breathe freely, and stand behind the Empire until a decisive victory crowns its arms.

A Disputed Election, Victoria.

Melbourne, 12th May.

Mr. T. M. McCormick has lodged a petition for the Geelong seat of the Victorian Assembly, alleging that his opponent, Mr. R. Purnell, is disqualified by holding a Government contract.

Victorian Schools' Rowing Contests.

Melbourne, 12th May.

The preliminary heats for the head of River, an annual rowing event of Victorian schools, took place on the Yarra yesterday, and attracted a crowd of 50,000. Geelong Grammar School easily beat Scots College, Geelong College similarly defeated St. Xaviers, and Wesley College beat Melbourne Grammar School, last year's Premiers, by a narrow margin: after a great contest, amidst intense excitement.

Funeral of Archbishop Carr.

Melbourne, 12th May.

Yesterday, 30,000 men, women and children viewed the body of the late Archbishop Carr, at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Melbourne. The burial took place on Saturday at the Sacred Heart Chapel, when 200 priests officiated. There was a lengthy funeral procession through the streets, which was a solemn, impressive spectacle.

Fire at Townsville, Queensland.

Brisbane, 15th May.

A large store on the pier at Townsville, Queensland, has been destroyed by a fire which the fire brigade was unable to subdue. Spirits and oils burnt fiercely and the building collapsed. The damage done was between £50,000 and £100,000.

Offensive Behaviour!

Sydney, 15th May.

A man named Francis White, aged 51, has been bound over to be of good behaviour for 12 months on a charge of offensive behaviour in Sydney. According to the evidence given, the defendant in the street kissed two returned soldiers, who resented his conduct.

South Australian Parliament.

Adelaide, 15th May.

Recent bye-elections in South Australia have reduced the State National Party Labour Ministry's seats to 19. The Liberals hold 22 seats and the United Labour Party 4 seats. The Liberals at present support the Ministry.

Progress in Papua.

Melbourne, 15th May.

Judge Murray, Lieutenant-Governor of Papua, is visiting Melbourne. He gives a good account of the development of the territory, which he believes will be self-supporting before long.

Sir Alexander MacCormick.

A Melbourne telegram says that Sir Alexander MacCormick has accepted the position of consulting surgeon to the Imperial Army in France. Six Alexander, who is consulting surgeon to the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, Sydney, served in the same capacity in the British Army in South Africa during the Boer War.

Schools' Flag Ceremonies.

Melbourne, 15th May.

Flags were exchanged on Empire Day last year between Culcairn School, Riverina, and Culcairn, Scotland, which is the Governor-General's home parish. The Australian flag is to be saluted in Scotland this year, and the Scottish Standard is to be hoisted in Australia. The Governor-General and Lady Helen Munro Ferguson are to be present.

Soldiers' Votes for the Nationalists.

Sydney, 15th May.

The first return of the votes of soldiers overseas which reached Australia to-day gives overwhelming support to the Nationalists and emphasises their victory, the most complete which has been gained by any party since the Federation. These votes make secure all the Senate seats in the six States, with large majorities for the Nationalists. The Government hope that as a result of the soldiers' votes they will retain Angas, where Mr. Glynn previously had a minority owing to the hostile German vote, and also Kalgoorlie and possibly Macquarie and Barrier. —"Morning Post" Correspondent.

Race Meetings in Victoria.

Melbourne, 16th May.

The Victorian Cabinet has decided to adhere to last year's decision restricting race meetings in Victoria. For the year the Proprietary Clubs' meetings have been reduced from 71 to 50. The Hon. D. McLeod, Chief Secretary of Victoria, states that Proprietary Clubs had a revenue last year of £170,000, and apparently made no patriotic contributions, whereas the V.R.C. gave £35,167 and the V.A.T.C. £16,700, and both clubs also invested largely in War Loans.

Effect of Soldiers' Votes.

Melbourne, 16th May.

The first progress return of the soldiers' votes abroad materially improves the position of a number of Ministerialists, whose election was hitherto doubtful. Mr. P. M. Glynn's minority of 150 has been converted into a majority of 18. Mr. Heitmann now leads Mr. Mason for Kalgoorlie by 120.

National Government Projected in W.A.

Perth, 16th May.

At a meeting of the West Australian political parties, with the exception of the Official Labour Party, it was decided to call a conference representative of all parties, including the Official Labour Party, on the question of forming a National Government.

Australian Cuthberts.

Perth, 16th May.

The Recruiting Committee has asked the Premier to stimulate recruiting by removing from the Civil Service all single men fit for active service.

The Premier, in a sympathetic reply, said the Commonwealth should take initial action, and he promised to communicate with the Federal Government.—Reuter.

Captain Glossop's New Appointment.

Sydney, 16th May.

Captain Glossop, who was in charge of H.M.A.S. "Sydney" when she sank the "Emden," arrived in Sydney on Tuesday, May 15th. He is to control the Naval establishments in Sydney in succession to Commodore Henderson.

Football League President Resigns.

Melbourne, 17th May.

The Press reports that Mr. Williams is resigning the Presidency of the Victorian Football League, as he is dissatisfied with the clubs' contributions to patriotic funds from the proceeds of last season's games.

The Soldiers' Vote.

Melbourne, 17th May.

The first return of the soldiers' vote embraces 22,000 Senate votes, 19,337 for the House of Representatives. Of the latter 13,115 were cast for Ministerialists and 6,213 for the Opposition, 9 for Independents. Three doubtful

Ministerial seats are probably placed beyond question by the soldiers' votes; also one more Opposition seat is likely to be won by Ministerialists, making the position of parties: Ministerialists, 54; Opposition, 21. Mr. Oldham states that 86 per cent. of the soldiers entitled to vote exercised their right.

Mr. Hughes, in commenting on the soldiers' vote, said it is one of the most gratifying features of the appeal to the people. The victory of the Nationalist Party would serve as an additional spur to Australian troops, who are covering themselves each day with fresh glories.

Mining Under Bendigo City.

Melbourne, 17th May.

A scheme has been formulated to mine the city area of Bendigo. Property owners agree to operations within a hundred feet of the surface, and will receive a 6 per cent. royalty on the gold won.

Mr. Hughes's Clean Sweep.

Sydney, 18th May.

It is officially stated that 86 per cent. of the soldiers in England who were entitled voted in the recent Australian elections, with the result that the indications are that, in addition to a clean sweep of the Senate vacancies, the Hughesites (War Party) secure over 50 of the 75 seats in the House of Representatives.

Mr. Hughes declares that this is an overwhelming endorsement of his win-the-war policy.—Exchange Telegraph.

Important Speech by Mr. Hughes. Terms of Peace: Proposed Imperial Cabinet.

Melbourne, 19th May.

Mr. Hughes, referring to the speech in the House of Commons on Wednesday by the Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, said that the clear and definite statement of Lord Robert Cecil that peace is impossible upon any basis which excludes annexation and indemnity, will be accepted throughout the Empire, and Australia especially will most certainly subscribe. The question of indemnity is one that is accepted by even those who babble about peace in a world in which there is and can be no peace while the military power of that nation upon whose shoulders rests the awful guilt of provoking this dreadful war remains unbroken. Clearly Belgium and Serbia are entitled to restoration and indemnity, so far as it lies within the power of mortal man to effect this.

As for annexation, while the ideal of territorial aggrandisement is repugnant to our ideals and our policy, yet common prudence and regard for the creation of such conditions as will make for a lasting peace will compel the Allies to annex such territory as will safeguard the future of civilisation.

It is perfectly obvious, for example, that we cannot contemplate peace that would mean a restoration to Germany of an opportunity to create at our very doors means for further onslaughts upon Australia. The destiny of Australasia depends upon the control of the Pacific being in the hands of the Empire and its Allies. Mr. Hughes said, regarding Mr. Lloyd George's speech outlining this proposal for the holding of an Imperial Cabinet annually, that, while it is impossible to predict the precise form which Imperial relations now in a state of flux will ultimately take, yet a great step has been taken in affirming the principle of an Imperial Cabinet at which members representing the self-governing Dominions shall sit yearly, or oftener if need be, to decide matters of Imperial policy.

Precisely what the limitations of the powers of such a Cabinet will be, and to what extent its decisions will be followed by British Dominions and Indian Parliaments, it is impossible to say. It appeared to him, however, that there were certain limitations imposed upon the powers of such a Cabinet by the very nature of the powers of self-government enjoyed by every part of the Empire, which seemed to render any attempt to graft upon this system of responsible government an Imperial Cabinet having plenary jurisdiction over every part of the Empire impracticable, if not impossible.

Navy Day in Tasmania.

Hobart, 19th May.

A Navy Day is being arranged in Tasmania for June 4th. The proceeds will be devoted to providing comforts for the Imperial Australian Navy, and a naval home in Hobart for men in the fleet.

Compulsory Service Advocated.

Perth, 20th May.

The Recruiting Committee has unanimously resolved, following upon the people's unmistakable mandate, that Mr. Hughes be asked to introduce immediately legislation compelling every eligible man in his proper turn to take his place at the front.

Munificent Gifts.

Brisbane, 21st May.

Mr. William Naughton, late of Koon-drook, Victoria, who is now living in Queensland, has forwarded a cheque for £100 to Bendigo charities in honour of Mr. Hughes's election, and has also invested £10,000 in the Commonwealth War Loan, the interest of which is to be paid to the Wounded Soldiers' Fund.

Waking Australia Up!

Melbourne, 21st May.

Sir William Irvine, speaking at the Wesley Church, Melbourne, on Sunday, said he believed that many Australians were not yet fully awakened to perils threatening them. He deprecated cheerful optimism, and urged universal war service. He asked, had we no duty towards the three hundred thousand Australians who had already answered the call? Many of these men had been from the firing line to the hospitals on several occasions, and were yearning to see Australia again. It was our duty to let them realise their desire.

Massed Bands Play for Red Cross.

Melbourne, 21st May.

A performance of massed bands was held on the Cricket Ground, Melbourne, on Sunday, in aid of the British Red Cross. Though the attendance was marred by heavy rain, 5,000 persons were present. The performance will be repeated next Sunday.

Luxuries Board Regulations.

Melbourne, 21st May.

The Luxuries Board has issued regulations to provide for the restriction or prohibition of articles not essential to the general health and welfare of the community, and for the encouragement of the production of goods in Australia by bounties.

GENERAL CABLES.

Madame Melba arrived in Melbourne on May 8th from America.

The total enlistments in the Commonwealth last week were 1,048.

Archbishop Carr's estate has been valued at under £500.

The estate of the late William Drummond, of Toorak, is valued at £92,400.

The Mount Lyell dispute is still unsettled, and 6,000 miners are idle.

A private company proposes to bridge the river Derwent at Risdon, near Hobart.

Snowy Corbett, lightweight boxer, has been accepted for active service on the third attempt.

Lithgow Small Arms Factory, New South Wales, has sent away a record number of rifles.

The death at the age of 92 is announced of John Rees, an early Melbourne politician.

Mr. Elmslie, State Labour Leader in Victoria, has returned from a health trip to Honolulu.

Chaplain-Colonel G. J. Mackay was welcomed back to Melbourne on Monday evening, May 14th.

The South Australian Government statist estimates the last harvest of both wheat and barley as a record.

Alderman Evan Jones, of Sydney, who has been prominent in municipal life for 30 years, has died.

Five vessels from the East have been quarantined on account of small-pox during the past five months.

In the suit between the Zinc Corporation, Ltd., and Aaron Sirsah and Sohn, judgment has been given by Mr. Justice Hood for £84,000, with costs. A stay of proceedings for 21 days has been granted.

The Hon. W. B. F. MacDonald, Minister for Agriculture, Mines, and Postmaster-General of New Zealand, is visiting Australia on Dominions business. He is a native of Camperdown, Victoria.

NEWS BY CABLE—Continued.

The Melbourne Cup winner, Parisian, who was injured at a patriotic race meeting recently, has now been destroyed.

The steamer *Alfred* sank on the River Murray, near Mallara, and Charles Thorn, a barge hand, was drowned.

It was reported at a meeting of the Wagga Wagga Pastoralists' Protection Board that rabbit trappers in the district are making £10 or £12 a week.

The death is reported of Dansel Wilkie, solicitor, of Melbourne, who was a well-known East Melbourne cricketer.

Mrs. Alfred Deakin, urging support for the Anzac Buffet, considers it a powerful factor for the good of A.I.F. soldiers in London.

Lady Stanley hopes to receive a total of £100,000 for the British Red Cross in the month of May. £70,000 is in hand already.

Lieutenant Manifold, an old Geelong Grammar School boy, who was killed in action in France, bequeathed £3,000 as a fund for a scholarship to the sons of old boys of the school.

The mineral exports of New South Wales during the first three months of the year were valued at £2,737,000, an increase of £1,023,000 over the corresponding period of 1916.

It has been decided to hold a demonstration in Hobart in June to celebrate the Nationalist victory, and to raise funds to help Mr. Howroyd's widow and family.

Mr. Carty Salmon, member of the House of Representatives-elect for the Grampians, Victoria, who was seized with a sudden illness on Tuesday, May 8th, is now out of danger.

Thomas Ehill has been fined £500 at Millthorpe, New South Wales, for holding a race meeting on an unregistered course at Forest Reefs, at which admission was charged and betting was conducted.

At the Prahra Court, five female fortune tellers were fined for obtaining money from clients anxious about their relatives at the war. The Bench stated that the cases deserved imprisonment.

The barn and stables of Mr. Mc-Nikee, Wagga Wagga, New South Wales, valued at £800, and a general store belonging to J. S. Taylor, of Junee, valued at £7,000, have been destroyed by fires, apparently caused by mice.

A memorial brass was unveiled at Melbourne Hospital to the late Captain Mathison by Professor Sir Harry Allen. Subscribers to this have also founded a Triennial Mathison Lectureship in Melbourne University.

The Victorian Education Department's War Relief Fund, a subsection of the Australian Comforts' Fund, has reached £170,300, mostly earned by the work of children in growing flowers and vegetables and making articles for sale.

The Syme Prize for 1917 has been awarded to H. J. Grayson, of Melbourne University for a Thesis on the Construction of a Dividing Engine for Ruling Diffraction Gratings.

A well-known pastoralist in New South Wales has offered to insure 500 married recruits against death or total disablement. Several others are offering insurances from £500 to £1,000 for the same purpose.

Mr. Howroyd, Nationalist member-elect for Darwin, Tasmania, who defeated Mr. King O'Malley, died suddenly of heart failure on Thursday, May 10th. A fresh election is anticipated. Mr. King O'Malley states that he has had enough and will not be a candidate.

An interesting lecture has been delivered by Mrs. Alfred Deakin on baby clinics to members of the Victorian Children's Welfare Association. Her account of experiences and methods studied in America and England aroused attention.

The Braybrook Council is adopting regulations for the prevention of slum areas: on the Maidstone Estate the minimum area for building sites is 5,000 square feet, with a frontage of 50 feet and a depth of 100 feet.

The Commonwealth Government has sold to New Zealand 1,500,000 bushels of wheat, with the option of one million bushels more.

Millers say they are able to produce 120,000 tons annually for export. This means an enormous saving in tonnage and a large development in the local milling industry.

It is proposed that the mills shall work day and night to their utmost capacity.

Japanese exports to Australia in 1916 reached a total value of £2,951,419. The imports into Japan from Australia were valued at £4,604,093.

From Storekeeper to Baronet.

Mr. A. H. Lees, a storekeeper at the Naval Office, Fremantle, has received advice that his father, Sir Garcourt Lees, Baronet, died in America last week, and that he has succeeded to the baronetcy. The new baronet has been employed at the Naval Office for the past three years, prior to which he was engaged in farming in the eastern districts of this State.

Women's War Medals.

Particulars of the war medals which will be issued to the nearest female relatives of soldiers of the Australian Imperial Forces have been given in Melbourne by the Minister for Defence (Mr. Pearce). The tokens will be worn with ribbon and bars. A mother with seven sons at the war will be given a medal with seven bars. When there are a mother and a wife, the wife will be given the medal.

The Hindenburg Line.

Stretcher Bearers' Work. The Huns in the Dug-out.

British Headquarters, France,
May 13th.

When you get near the Hindenburg Line, where the Australians took it over a week ago, you will see, at any time of the day a small party of men walking over the bare slopes towards you with something carried high on four men's shoulders. They bring it straight over the back of the trench, across the red pounded dust region where the barrage falls, straight up the shell-pitted green wheatfields which the Germans must have sown last autumn for their own use, in a bee line to some tiny dressing station under a shattered ghastly bank; and from there directly up the open crest to a waggon, which always waits for them. They are the stretcher-bearers.

The Germans say they have strict orders not to shoot at them. I cannot speak for their infantry, but I have seen the German artillery follow them stage by stage with single sniping shells. It seems to be a point of honour with the bearers, however close a shell falls, never to turn a head or quicken pace by a second. Four German prisoners and four Australian stretcher-bearers were bringing out their respective comrades a few days ago, when a big shell burst between them. The Germans did not wait for ceremony—they literally threw their wounded fellow-countryman, stretcher and all, on to the ground and bolted for cover. The Australians never altered their direction or their pace, nor even turned to look.

The Shattered Wire.

It is there in front of you before you realise that you are within half a mile of it—a low untidy scratched and dishevelled breadth of wire, running like a belt of thin dead, downtrodden scrub across the reddish powdered and cratered earth slope below you. It is the Hindenburg wire—the defence on which the Germans have relied more, perhaps, than on any other means of fortification. The heavy guns have smashed and torn it as I never saw wire broken before. Every man who came back after the attack volunteered—the wire was “beautifully” cut.

Beyond the wire was a sea of shell-holes for 70 or 80 yards, and then we dropped into a sort of depression which wandered through the shellholes. By the relics of battle in it—odds and ends

of kit and other dust-covered relics more dreadful—one knew that it was a trench. But it wandered more like some shallow water channel connecting the shellholes.

It was the old front line of the Hindenburg system.

A Massive Trench.

Further on we came across lengths of trench not so very different from what it was when the Germans finished it. It was all of the massive, regular pattern which the German uses; with magnificent wide traverses or buttresses to stop the burst of even the biggest shell from enfiling the bays: a deep, wide, massive trench with clean-cut earthen walls. The Germans had not had time to revet the sides—that is to say to line and prop them up with hurdles or galvanised iron. He had just begun to do so in some parts.

Also, there was no cement used in the dug-outs, so far as we could see. They were deep, with the ordinary wood-lined staircases, and fair sized chambers at the bottom held up with stout pine logs. In most of his trench systems which are thought out beforehand the German builds the dug-outs first and then digs the trench afterwards; and I think he must have done so here. The trenches were only just finished, and there were the spades of working parties in the dug-outs when the Australians first entered them on April 11th.

The Old Occupants.

It was in one of these dug-outs, after a certain company headquarters of ours had occupied it for about eighteen hours and had finally handed over to another company, that a signaller went round a corner of the chamber and heard someone say quietly, “Kamerad.” He found there five Germans who had been in the place the whole time, lying quietly behind the corner in the hope, I suppose, that we might still be driven out and their friends come back.

The Hindenburg parapet looks out on a shattered, powdered slope of terracotta earth, across which runs the remains of a hedge, sticking up from the soil as the black hogged mane bristles along the neck of a roan horse. Further, half a mile up the slope, are the pounded remains of the village of Riencourt, still largely standing. An empty hollow road runs straight into the middle of it. Not a stir or a sign of

a movement in the village. Not a vestige of life in the dusty, shell-smitten road—nothing but the sudden sing of some sniper's bullet wickedly down it. There was tremendous fighting in that road in April: and two Germans lie there still in the dust.

An Australian sentry—one of our same old Australians of Ballarat or Moonee Ponds or Korong Vale—is looking out steadfastly over the parapet. Our heavy shells are pounding huge wreaths of white chalk dust and pink powdered brick out of Riencourt. The German is thumping the Hindenburg Line with heavy shell also. As for Bullecourt, three-quarters of a mile to our left rear, it has been such a cauldron of bursting shell that sometimes for many minutes together you can see no sign of any part of it, only a fuming, smoking, steaming curtain of shell dust—brown, black and white. If it goes on much longer I suppose these villages will disappear as utterly as any on the Somme.

Australians at Bullecourt.

“Convey deepest admiration for Australians' magnificent victory at Bullecourt from the Victorian Branch of the Returned Soldiers' and Sailors' Imperial League, Australia.”

The “Dilly” Ways of Civilisation.

“McNorth,” writing in “Sydney Bulletin,” says:—Black brother isn't surprised at the wonders of civilisation to any great extent. He is too philosophical. I once asked a far-outblack nig. if he didn't think matches were wonderful things to make fire with. He replied indifferently: “Oh, matchiss he nothing; he fashion belong white man.” He blamed the things he didn't understand on to the white man as a matter of course, and let it go at that. A Papuan who had accompanied his boss on a trip south was asked what he considered the most wonderful thing in Sydney. The fuzzy-headed child of nature, unimpressed by the motors, trams, picture-shows, ferries, and all the rest of it, answered that it was marvellous how all the people of the city lived, as not one of them seemed to have a garden. He reckoned, also, the people were more or less dilly because they put on their clothes in the daytime when it was hot and took them off at night when it was cold. A New Guinea man, being sane, reverses the process.

A Desperate Move.

On Hindenburg Line. Germans' Latest Attempt.

British Headquarters, France, May 19

Four days ago the Germans made their latest counter-attack against the Hindenburg Line occupied by the Australians. They had made at least a dozen before, and it seemed to them that these must all have gone wrong for want of careful planning. This time they decided to make no mistake about it.

They withdrew from the Third Guard Division, which was opposing us after we captured the Hindenburg Line east of Bullecourt, the Lehr Regiment—which is a regiment very closely connected with the Kaiser's personal guard. When the Lehr Regiment came to the Western Front a year ago from Russia, the Kaiser issued an order to it speaking of its wonderful success in the east and calling it by the nickname which he had invented for it, "My Cockchafers."

When it got out into rest on May 12th the Lehr Regiment was informed that, in consideration of its prowess, it was to be given the task of taking back the portion of the Hindenburg Line which had been lost by the Germans on May 3rd. The attack was to be very carefully practised; and after it had been carried out the Regiment would be definitely taken out of the line for a rest. The men understood that there was ahead of them a good rest in a far back area, where the regiment would refit and fill up its ranks before going into the line again.

Minutely Practised.

Aeroplane photographs were taken of the part of the line held by the Australians on the right where they touched the Germans in the Hindenburg Line. And from these a set of dummy trenches was dug in the rest area. The regiment set itself to practise against these replica trenches exactly the attack which it would make against the right of the Australians in the Hindenburg Line.

It went over the attack first by day, and then afterwards repeated it by night. There were men told off with little white screens, which were planted to show exactly the position which they had reached. Each man in the attack knew where to go and what to do, so that even if his company officers and non-commissioned officers were killed the attack would go on unaltered. Three days later the regiment marched back to take up its positions. The feel-

ing was that the attack was so well planned that it could not go wrong.

The Germans Appear.

Meanwhile, from about eight o'clock on the morning of May 14th the German trench mortars and artillery had begun to bombard the Australian line. After dark that night the bombardment became heavy. It relented a little in the middle of the night and then descended upon the trenches in a torrent of shells and trench mortar bombs. From a quarter past three in the morning the hail became terrific. Half an hour later it suddenly was raised from the front trenches; and the same moment Germans appeared scrambling over the tumbled, shell-pitted brown ploughfield, which is all that now remains of the Hindenburg line at this point.

As the dark figures came tumbling over these earth billows there opened on them first the peck, peck, peck of a few warning rifles, and then the increasing rattle of musketry and machine-guns. At some points the machine-guns opened instantaneously. The Germans attacked on a wide front reaching to away opposite the British at Bullecourt. But along most of this front, where the ground was fairly level and they had to come at the trenches from straight ahead, the wave never reached the British trench at all.

On the right, however, where the Germans and the Australians are in the same line of trenches, the Australians holding a portion of the two Hindenburg trenches and the Germans holding the same trenches about forty yards further along with a short length of battered unoccupied trench in between, the Germans came out from both trenches and from the front in great force. One after another, four waves of dark figures attempted to rush over the tumbled earthen sea against the two ends of the trench held by the Australians.

A good part of them were mown down at once with bombs and machine-guns. A portion managed to struggle through towards our front trench, and the dark figures could be seen running along it and at once dropping in. But the attack was already utterly disorganised. Within two minutes of the assault having been begun the results of all this careful planning and practice had been thrown to the winds. All that remained of it was between two and

three hundred Germans in a section of Australian trench, with scarcely any idea of where they were and what was happening, and machine-gun bullets sweeping above their heads and making any sort of movement utterly perilous.

Two Things Happened.

Then two things happened. First, down from the skies came the British barrage; and all speak of it as one of the finest barrages ever put up. It drew a line just behind the Germans and on to that line there thundered down heavy shells and shrapnel and trench mortar bombs, so that it was more dangerous for the German to go back than to go forward. Secondly, over the top straight at them came a counter-attack of Australians, organised at once on the spot by the company officers of the New South Wales battalion holding the trenches. The Germans ran before it and dropped into the trench again at the extreme far end of the Australian position where they had first entered. There, cooped up between our barrage behind them and our troops holding them in front, they stood at bay for the moment in a short length of trench.

It was less than a single Australian battalion which had done all this work on the right against two German battalions and a specially picked assault troops which attacked. The British troops had beaten back the attack opposite them further along the position. And some of them undertook to take over part of the Australian front and guard it, so that the Australians there should be freed to organise a final counter-attack and clear their trenches. Australian officers speak most warmly of the way in which these troops—they were Londoners—supported them during this fight.

The Germans were in their corner of trench for about three hours. Then the same Australian battalion—there was only the normal garrison of the place in the actual fighting from first to last—delivered up the trenches its two counter-attacks; it was broad daylight, and I do not think that a single German of those then in the place reached the German lines. The trench was cleared at once.

In the first inrush of the Germans an Australian in part of the trench in which they jumped was taken prisoner. He was being sent off to the rear under escort when both of his guards were shot. He made his way back through the awful turmoil, through the Germans to the Australians, found his company commander, and acted as his runner during the rest of the fight and for some days afterwards until he was sent away against his wishes.

GENERAL AUSTRALIAN NEWS

The Government Statistician estimated the population of Sydney on December 31, 1916, at 764,600.

How these politicians love one another! A West Australian minister referred to a member of the Senate as "a suit of clothes and a name."

The Postal Department has had to write off £7,000 for pre-war money orders owing by Germany to the Commonwealth. The latter, however, owes Austria nearly £10,500 on the same item.

Mr. Ryan, Premier of Queensland, is one of the hustlers who get where they want. He was in a hurry to get to Sydney from Adelaide, but the express had left. He chartered a motor, raced the train to Aldgate (22 miles out), picked up the mail there, and sped on.

Times have changed. Years ago all a political candidate wanted as equipment for his address was a brass band and a few friendly barrackers. Now the crowd expects him to talk—intelligently.

Motor Sales Booming.

Motor cars continue to be purchased in New South Wales in large numbers. During the week ended on Tuesday, March 27, there were 116 new cars registered at the Police Department, Phillip-street, City, which, averaged at a cost of £300 each, means an expenditure of £34,800. This is an increase of 15 cars over each of the previous two weeks.

In addition to the 116 cars there were three new taxi-cabs, seven new lorries, and 53 motor-cycles registered.

Darcy May Become U.S.A. Citizen.

This paragraph, clipped from a New York paper, is published for what it is worth:—

"Les Darcy may become an American citizen. Likewise his pal and manager, Timothy O'Sullivan, plans to take out papers which will secure for him the protection enjoyed by all Americans. Darcy and O'Sullivan have been greatly impressed with this country as far as they have seen it. They say that the customs of the people here, not to mention the advantages of the United States has over their native land in many ways, have won them over to the idea of becoming naturalised. Darcy, it is said, plans to bring his parents and his brothers and sisters to this country if he takes out citizenship papers."



Not Guilty.

Henry James Stevens, a taxi car driver, was recently, at the Sydney Central Criminal Court, found not guilty of a charge of manslaughter, and was discharged. Stevens was driving along Flinders-street, Darlinghurst, on the night of January 23, with Arthur Patrick Murray, a member of the Expeditionary Forces, and two other persons in the taxi, when the wheels skidded. Murray was leaning over the side of the car, and his head coming into contact with a verandah post, he was killed. The jury found for acquittal without leaving the box, his Honour adding that he agreed with the verdict.

Mysterious Shot at Surry Hills, Sydney.

A mysterious shooting took place in Crown-street, Surry Hills, early on March 31, as a result of which Richard James Alexander, 25, was admitted to Sydney Hospital with a bullet wound in his stomach.

Alexander, who lives in Riley-street, City, walked into the hospital at about a quarter past 2 in the morning. He was in a condition bordering on collapse, and did not give any account of how he met with the injury.

Alexander was with three other men in Crown-street at about a quarter to 2, when some disturbance took place and a shot was fired. A bullet struck Alexander, and the other men then disappeared.

Manager of State Shipbuilding.

After the State Cabinet announced its intention of appointing a business manager to the State shipbuilding yards at a salary of £1,500 a year, over 90 applications were received for the position. The Cabinet has selected Mr. A. M. Bomphrey, at present manager of Messrs. J. I. Thornycroft and Company's shipbuilding yard at Woolston, Southampton (England), for the post. Mr. Bomphrey is 42 years of age.

Mr. Dicker's Appeal Dismissed.

The Tasmanian Full Court dismissed the appeal of David E. Dicker, Labour member in the House of Assembly for Franklin, against conviction by a police magistrate (Mr. W. O. Wise) and a fine of £15 on the charge of having used words calculated to prejudice recruiting. Appellant was also ordered to pay the costs of the appeal.

Wages Plus Shares.

With a view of securing increased production, Australian farmers have offered fixed rates of wages to agricultural labourers, and at the same time to allow them the returns from specified portions of their land.

Dutch "Anti-Recruiter" Fined.

At the Central Police Court, Sydney Frederick Meeus Ekkelboom, a Hollander, was recently charged with having made statements likely to prejudice recruiting. George Ashton, secretary of the Municipal Employees' Union, said that he heard the accused say that the man who put on a uniform to fight for the capitalists was a fool, and asked, "Why should we treat the Germans as enemies?" The accused, in reply to a question, said he had bought the I.W.W. paper, "Direct Action," because he wanted to know of the organisation. He denied that he was a member of the I.W.W. He was fined £15, in default three months' imprisonment.

New Disease at Broken Hill.

A new disease has been causing some alarm amongst Broken Hill doctors, particularly at the hospital, where several deaths have occurred during the past week. The early stages of the disease are like those of meningitis, then blood-poisoning sets in. The doctors at the hospital have communicated with the authorities in Sydney, in an effort to solve the problem of the disease.

Queensland's Next Sugar Crop.

The Queensland Treasurer (Mr. Theodore) returned to Brisbane on March 27 from a three weeks' visit to North Queensland. In the course of an interview Mr. Theodore stated that the prospects for next season's sugar crops are excellent. It is expected that the State mill at Babinda will crush 150,000 tons of cane, and the new mill at South Johnstone 110,000 tons. Mining is showing signs of activity, where the production of molybdenite and wolfram is a feature. There is considerable activity in copper mining in the Herberton district, but there is no general movement towards resuming operations in the bigger mines until the Chillagoe and other smelters are reopened.

Railway Deficit in S.A.

No improvement took place in the financial year ended June 30, 1916, in the result of working the railway from Port Augusta to Oodnadatta, the total loss incurred being £122,210. The aggregate loss to June 30, 1916, was £544,105.

Coal Output in N.S.W.

The report of the New South Wales Mines Department for 1916 states that the output of coal during the year was 8,127,161 tons, valued at £3,336,419, which is a decrease of 1,321,847 tons when compared with the year 1915.

Annual Wool Show, Melbourne.

At a well-attended meeting of the Australian Sheepbreeders' Association, held in Melbourne on March 23, the president, Mr. James McLaughlin, being in the chair, it was unanimously decided that the annual show should be held this year at Messrs. Goldsbrough, Mort, and Co.'s warehouse, Collins-street, Melbourne, on Monday, July 30, and Tuesday, July 31. A schedule of prizes for fine and strong wool merinoes, small holders' merinoes, Lincolns, Border and English Leicesters, Shropshires, Southdowns, Romney Marsh, and Corriedales was adopted, and is being prepared for issue to breeders at an early date.

Domestic Tragedy in N.S.W.

A domestic tragedy, resulting in the death of Thomas Thorley and his wife, occurred at Luskintyre, in the Maitland district, on March 27. Thorley had been living apart from his wife, and recently, it is alleged, she had threatened to take divorce proceedings. This morning the husband came down from Nar-

rabri, and subsequently visited the residence of his wife. He fired three shots at Mrs. Thorley, all of which took effect. Thorley afterwards took a dose of poison, and then turned the revolver upon himself, the bullet penetrating his brain. A family of eight children is left, the youngest being five years of age.

Woman Sues Union in N.S.W.

Frances Egan has brought an action against the Barrier branch of the Amalgamated Miners' Association for the recovery of damages, to the amount of £1,000, owing to the defendants having brought about her wrongful dismissal as a cook. Mrs. Egan was one of the employers who was opposed to there being any alteration in the hotel employees' log. For some time the catering business in Broken Hill was greatly disorganised. When the trouble was settled, her restaurant business was ruined. She had to take a position as cook with Mr. E. P. Conroy, of Broken Hill, who had a cafe there. She was not allowed to work in peace, however, for Mr. Conroy was informed that unless he dismissed her his place would be boycotted. Eventually he told her that he could not keep her in the circumstances.

Michael John Noonan, hotelkeeper, in giving evidence, said that the day after the issue of the award the magis-

trate had tried to get the union to agree to abide by it.

Mr. Justice Pring: I don't know if this is the usual procedure, but it only shows the utter worthlessness of wages boards and industrial courts. I do not know what would happen if the judge here had to have a conference with the parties to get them to obey an order of the Court. What sort of a Supreme Court would that be? The idea of a tribunal begging the parties to obey an award! It is a grotesque travesty. The proposition put forward that if a union could not get what it wanted by an award it was entitled to use force was not law. When it did become law the country would not be fit to live in.

After a retirement of 20 minutes the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff for £450 damages against all the defendants.

Ten Years for Forging Notes.

Mr. Justice Sly, who had postponed sentence upon John James Ferguson, who was found guilty at his re-trial on a charge of having forged Australian £5-notes, imposed a term of ten years' imprisonment, with hard labour.

The End of It.

The I.W.W. has decided not to go further with appeals in the matter of the men sentenced to terms of imprisonment for recent crimes in Sydney.

The Totalisator in Victoria.

The Victorian State Cabinet decided on March 27 that no steps should be taken by the Ministry to introduce the totalisator in Victoria. A deputation from the Australian Natives' Association recently waited upon the Chief Secretary (Mr. McLeod), and urged the introduction of the totalisator, and racing bodies have asked that the Ministry should make a declaration of its intention. The Premier (Sir Alexander Peacock) has since stated that the Cabinet had reaffirmed previous decisions, but though the Ministry would not introduce a totalisator bill it would arrange for time for the discussion of a measure if a private member should desire to introduce one during the coming session.

No Reduction of Pension.

In a specific case as to the pension of a one-legged soldier of Victoria, who is earning (by bag-sewing) money over and above what he is allowed, it is stated by the Federal Treasurer that any reduction of the amount allowed a wounded soldier is forbidden by the law, and is not to be effected. In this instance the allowance is 22s. 6d. a week to the man, 11s. 3d. a week to his wife (to continue), and 20s. 8d. per week for four children—to cease when each reaches 16 years.

Narrow Escape From a Snake.

James Cromedy, of Beaufort, was attempting to kill a snake with a short stick, when the stick broke, and the reptile attacked him, and wound itself round his leg. The snake twice struck at him, and embedded its fangs in his clothing, but he managed to shake it off, and afterwards killed it with a clod of earth. Cromedy was lucky enough to escape being bitten.

The Chief Justice.

Sir Samuel Griffith is making satisfactory progress towards recovery from his recent attack of sickness, but it will be some time before he will be able to resume his duties on the Bench of the High Court of the Commonwealth.

Melba in San Francisco.

Madame Melba gave the largest concert ever held in San Francisco on March 30 for the Allies' funds. Madame Melba herself bought the first box at auction for £100. The proceeds totalled over £4,000.

A mysterious telephone message to the effect that "something might happen" caused the Chief of Police to take extra precautions to guard the Auditorium. It was believed that German sympathisers had planned an outrage, but the concert passed off without any untoward incident.

The Grice Scholarship.

A scholarship has been founded at the Geelong Grammar School by Sir John Grice in memory of his son, Thomas Gerald Grice, an old Geelong Grammarian, who was killed in France on June 15, 1916. The scholarship is open to sons of commissioned officers of the British or Australian army or navy who have been killed in or died on active service in the present war. It is tenable for three years, and covers all school fees, both tuition and boarding, as well as other fixed charges. The first examination for the scholarship will be held in November next. Candidates must be under 14½ years of age.

A Long Walk.

A youth named Thomas Day, of Mount Gambier (S.A.), anxious to enlist, and having a preference for a Melbourne depot, started to walk there. He did about 50 miles on foot, then struck a job as a drover. After travelling with the sheep for three days he had earned enough to pay for a second-class ticket by rail from Serviceton. Arrived in Melbourne, he made a bee-line for the Town Hall, and offered himself as a recruit. The story ought to end with a V.C. But the plot went wrong, and the gritty youngster failed to pass the doctor. It wasn't his heart that was wrong, though.

SPORTING NOTES.

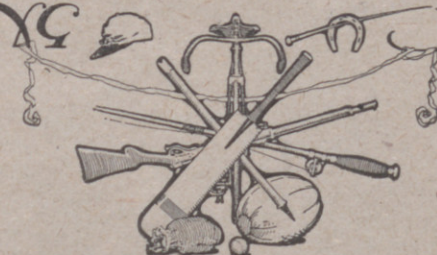
Sydney, 29th March.

E. S. Collins, Bananaland's breast-stroke champion for 1917, won the 100 yards in 1 min. 21½ sec. (2½ sec. outside the Staté record) and the 220 yards in 3 min. 25½ sec. He was a complete stranger to championship efforts before he defeated Brett (last year's champion), Springfield and Thurlow; but he seems to be a hustler who may be hard to separate from his title.

The A.J.C. notifies that conditions and added cash for the Spring handicaps of 1917 and the classic events up to 1919 will remain as heretofore, with the exception that the Sires' Produce Stakes nominator gets a rise in pocket-money from £100 to £250. The embargo (in operation since 1913) keeping geldings out of the Derby is lifted. Next year, therefore, colts and geldings will struggle under the same weight (8 st. 12 lb.) for the £5,000.

On a recent Saturday at Caulfield, in the South Yarra Handicap, the Welkin horse Three was No. 3 on the card, drew position No. 3, and though quoted 7-2 and 4-1 in the papers, the best price the writer heard at the start was 3-1. Finally the nag finished third.

Albert Lloyd is a hefty youth whom the Sydney Stadium first took notice of as a middleweight. Owing to the young man's habit of tying himself up he got hurt and adjourned. He is back now, bigger and wiser, and contending for the heavyweight championship. On Saturday he had a dispute with Colin Bell and within 5 sec. Colin found himself contending with what seemed like 14 locomotives. Lloyd hit him hard and often, and, powerful man though Bell is, the other was the stronger in clinches. The first round ended without a decisive smite. In the second Lloyd leaped at Bell like a hungry bear and handed out such an assortment of bash that Colin's bald



head was brought in sorrow to the mat. Lloyd meets Dave Smith next, on which occasion both parties will have to be on the alert for contingencies.

When Sydney, playing against Western Suburbs, closed their premiership innings on Saturday at 403 for nine wickets, Jimmy Taylor seized a bat and proceeded to smite the Sydney bowling. The Suburbs crumbled away at 277, but James was going strong to the last, finishing with 126 not out. This was his second century in the season, and brought his average for 10 innings to 58. Last year he made 622 runs, averaging 41.66 per innings.

The annual report of the Metropolitan Rugby Union (N.S.W.) is a mournful document. On one page is a memorial table of those affiliated players who have died on active service. There are 101 names on the list. Over the line at last!

Billy Monty, who had been helping to buff Abdul, was severely buffed by Bobby Graham at Brisbane on Saturday. It was a battle of giants, one turning the scale at 7 st. 11 lb. and the other at 8 st. Bobby knew too much about the fine points of the business and plastered William with straight lefts which turned the youth's dial into something like a sunset. There was always the chance that one of Billjim's swings would cause a sudden adjournment, but hopes of its arrival evaporated in the 19th round when his hand turned dog on him. It probably wouldn't have made any difference, anyway.—"Sydney Bulletin."

Australian Featherweight Champion.

The Australian featherweight title has been retained by Jimmy Hill, through his defeating Bert Spargo at Melbourne Stadium on Saturday, May 19th, on points, after an exciting contest. On the same day Herb McCoy knocked out Dave Meekin in the ninth round at Brisbane Stadium.

Melbourne Cup Stake Reduced.

The V.R.C. Committee has decided to reduce the stake for the Melbourne Cup from £7,000 to £6,000. The reduction is also announced of stakes for minor events. The conditions relating to penalties have been varied, and are as follows:—After July 31 the winner of any race of value to the winner of not less than £500 or more than £1,000, to carry 7 lb. extra; the winner of any race of the value to the winner of £1,000 or upwards, to carry an extra 10 lb.

Patrobas, by winning the King's Plate on the last day of the V.R.C. Autumn Meeting, raised the total of his earnings to £16,157. On present w.f.a. form he should bulge the purse further before the season ends. About half his rake-in was through the Melbourne Cup win.

Two plunging punters are said to have lost more than £20,000 between them on the Thursday of the V.R.C. Meeting. One of the bad investments was £9,000 to £4,000 on Patrobas.

Prahran bowler Blackie had the job of the season against Melbourne (the strongest batting club in Vic.) recently, and came out with four wickets for 91 runs in a total of 258. Warwick Armstrong (76) and Vernon Ransford (45) did much to take the sting out of the attack.

A Champion Cocky.

Maoriland's champion all-round cocky hails from the Mount Peel district. Some time back he acquired a small grazing run and 1,800 jumbucks for the purpose of growing wool. Labour being scarce, he acted as his own cook, offsider and musterer. He undressed the mob himself, 80 being the lowest tally put through the port-hole in one day, did his own classing, pickin'-up, rolling and baling, and handed his war profits over to the patriotic funds. If anyone is desirous of lending him a hand his present address is somewhere in front of the German lines.

A Veteran.

Adelaide has lost its veteran of military veterans, William Mills. He claimed to be 94, and his fighting was over before most grandfathers now living were born. It was against the Sikhs, at Sobraon, Chilianwallah, and so on, in the 40's—so long ago that his

medals attracted special attention from Kitchener when in Australia. Mills lost an eye in that long-ago campaign, but he told no thrilling tales about it, explaining modestly that it was done in a tent by the spur of "a comrade of mine who was making his bed." The old warrior was given a stirring military funeral by the Veterans' Corps in Adelaide—founded 30 years ago by actor Wybert Reeve.

Two Plucky Youngsters.

When the schooner Korora finished up off the Camden Haven Bight (Northern N.S.W.) the crew took to the boats and tried to land on a shelving beach within view of the lighthouse at Tacking Point. But the heavy seas off-shore continually washed them back, and when a lifebuoy attached to lines was lowered, an undercurrent made it useless. Then two lads in the knickerbocker stage, buckling on life-lines, swam out through the growling seas to the seamen. Considering that

this feat was undertaken at night-time during incessant rain and on an ugly coast with an evil name, it was worth the bronze medal the Royal Humane Society is awarding. The winners got their men ashore safely.

Uncle of Five V.C. Men.

Manager P. Farquharson, of the State metal quarry at Bombo (N.S.W.) has put up a record of a sort by being the uncle of five Victoria Cross winners in the present war. His own uncle won the Cross at Lucknow in the Mutiny days. Farquharson's two boys have got into khaki in the hope of adding to the family collection of decorative ironmongery.

Dead recently at Hay (N.S.W.) John Bent, brother of the late Thomas, Premier, etc., of Victoria. He was a native of the Nepean-Penrith district; his father and Henry Parkes were labourers on John Jamison's Regent Ville estate contemporaneously.

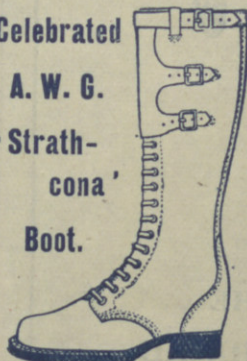
